
Dear parents/carers,

## Seatbelt

## Label uniform


We tend to find a lot of lost uniforms with no names on. This makes it difficult for us to identify which child it belongs to. Parents and carers, you can avoid spending unnecessary time and money on replacing your child's uniform if they are labelled.



## Home-time collection

Please can we remind all parents that if your child is getting collected by another relative/sibling or neighbour, office staff or class teacher must be informed. Please do not send other members to collect without our authorisation because most likely we will not hand your child over until we get a verbal consent from the parent. This is to ensure that children are safe at all times.





## Photo consent

Parents and Carers, if you have recently changed your mind about your child's photo/video consent, please make sure you fill out a pupil consent form which you can get from the main office. Unfortunately, we cannot accept a verbal dis/agreement as we require a document clearly outlining what your choices are. This is extremely important as we would NOT want to upload your child's photos without your permission.

## Minor ailments

Please do not keep your child away from school for minor ailments such as headaches and hay fever. If your child is feeling a little under the weather, you should send them to school and we will see how they feel throughout the day. If your child does not feel any better, we will contact you.





- Please bring your own carrier bags if you visit the food bank.
- You must escort your child to the hall doors when dropping them off for breakfast club. Please do not leave them to walk alone on the school grounds as there is no staff to supervise them in case of a fall.

## Unauthorised Leave

This week we sent home a briefing sheet from Bradford Council on how they will follow up absence due to unauthorised leave during term time.

Absence due to unauthorised leave during term time can include holidays during term time and travel to other countries to visit family and attend celebrations and events.

A decision has been made by Bradford Council to change their approach. When families

- take *two or more* periods of unauthorised leave in a 12-month period <u>or</u>
- when **a period of four or more weeks** of unauthorised leave is taken.

Bradford Council will take the option to start legal proceedings using the magistrates' court, instead of issuing a penalty notice as they do at the moment.

This means that parents may receive a significantly higher fine (up to **£2,500 per child, per parent**) if found guilty, and will receive a criminal record, which may be reportable to employers. In rare circumstances, magistrates can consider a custo-dial sentence for up to 3 months.

It's important that you are aware of this change so that you can take this information into consideration when deciding whether or not to take a period of unauthorised leave during term time.

This change will come into force from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2023.

As a school and Trust, we support the decision of Bradford Council: education is priceless.




